A LIFE INSPIRATION....

Helen Keller

"Character cannot be developed in ease and quiet. Only through experience of trial and suffering can the soul be strengthened, ambition inspired, and success achieved".

Helen Adams Keller, an author, activist and campaigner for deaf and blind charities is an inspirational icon for millions of people across the world who from being a deaf blind girl to graduating from Radcliffe and becoming a prominent writer and political activist provided inspiration to millions of people with disabilities. She became a celebrity at an early age and remained so through her life. Her life story, achievements and speeches continue to be a source of inspiration to millions of people across the globe.

Keller was born on June 27, 1880 in Tuscumbia, Alabama. Her father was Arthur Henley Keller and mother, Catherine Everett. In early 19 months of age, Keller contracted an unknown illness which might have been scarlet fever or meningitis. The illness left her both deaf and blind. In 1886, by the advice of Dr Chisholm, Keller was referred to Alexander Graham Bell, who was working with deaf children at the time and then was admitted to Perkins Institute for the Blind, the school in South Boston in 1988.In 1894, Keller and Sullivan moved to New York to attend the Wright-Hu mason School for the Deaf,

and to learn from Sarah Fuller at the Horace Mann School for the Deaf. In 1896, they returned to Massachusetts, and Keller entered The Cambridge School for Young Ladies before gaining admittance, in 1900, to Radcliffe College of Harvard University, where she lived in Briggs Hall, South House. In 1904, at the age of 24, Keller graduated as a member of Phi Beta Kappa from Radcliffe, becoming the **first deafblind person** to earn a Bachelor of Arts degree. Anne Sullivan stayed as a companion to Helen Keller long after she taught her. Keller wrote her autobiography at the age of 22, **"The Story of My Life"**, in which she recounted her journey from a child with an extreme handicap to a 21 year old student at Radcliffe. It has since been widely published and is still in print in over fifty languages. It was adapted into the famous Tony award winning play The Miracle Worker by William Gibson.







Helen Keller founded the Helen Keller International (HKI) in 1915. She was a lifelong supporter and ambassador of the organization. HKI combats the causes and consequences of blindness and malnutrition. Its two major areas of expertise are Eye Health and Nutrition. In 1924, Helen Keller joined the newly formed American Foundation for the Blind (AFB), an American non-profit organization for people with vision loss. The foundation provided her with a platform to advocate for the needs of people with vision loss. Her personality and international reputation helped her to secure large contributions for AFB from wealthy people including Henry Ford and John D.
Rockefeller. Keller travelled across the
United States for AFB and helped in the
creation of rehabilitation centers and state
commissions for the blind.

Keller travelled across the world making appearances and giving motivational speeches. She not only spoke for the rights of people with disabilities but also for other unprivileged sections of society. Between 1946 and 1957, Keller made seven trips across the world visiting 35 countries on five continents and meeting with world leaders including **Winston Churchill**, **Jawaharlal Nehru** and **Golda Meir**.

Writings:

Keller wrote a total of 12 published books and several articles.

One of her earliest pieces of writing, at age 11, was **The Frost King** (1891).

At age 22, Keller published her autobiography, **The Story of My Life** (1903), with help from Sullivan and Sullivan's husband, John Macy. It recounts the story of her life up to age 21 and was written during her time in college.

Keller wrote **The World I Live In** in 1908, giving readers an insight into how she felt about the world. Out of the Dark, a series of essays on socialism, was published in 1913.

Her spiritual autobiography, **My Religion**, was published in 1927 and then in 1994 extensively revised and reissued under the title **Light in My Darkness**.



Awards and Honors:

An inspiration to millions of people around the world, Helen Keller received numerous awards and honors...

In 1952, Keller was awarded with **The National Order of the Southern Cross** by
Brazil; and the **Legion of Honor**, the
highest French order for military and civil
merits.

In 1955, she became the first recipient of the **Order of the Golden Heart** of Philippines.

On September 14, 1964, President Lyndon B. Johnson conferred Helen Keller with the **Presidential Medal of Freedom**, the highest civilian award of the United States.

In 1965, she was one of the 20 women who were elected to the **National Women's Hall of Fame** at the New York World's Fair.

Other awards received by Keller include Japan's Sacred Treasure and Lebanon's Gold Medal of Merit.

In 1980, to mark the hundredth anniversary of Helen Keller's birth, the United States Postal Service issued a stamp featuring Keller and her teacher and companion Anne Sullivan.

In 1999, the **TIME magazine** included Keller in its list of the 100 most influential people of the 20th century.

From 1999 to 2008, the United States Mint issued a series of circulating commemorative coins which featured each of the 50 US states on unique designs for the reverse of the quarter.



A preschool for the deaf and hard of hearing in Mysore, India, was originally named after Helen Keller by its founder, K. K. Srinivasan.

In 2003, Alabama honoured its native daughter on its state quarter. The Alabama state quarter is the only circulating U.S. coin to feature braille.

The Helen Keller Hospital in Sheffield, Alabama, is dedicated to her.

Streets are named after Helen Keller in Zürich, Switzerland, in the US, in Getafe, Spain, in Lod, Israel, in Lisbon, Portugal, and in Caen, France.

In 1973, Helen Keller was inducted into the National Women's Hall of Fame.

A stamp was issued in 1980 by the United States Postal Service depicting Keller and Sullivan, to mark the centennial of Keller's birth.

On October 7, 2009, a bronze statue of Keller was added to the National Statuary Hall Collection, as a replacement for the State of Alabama's former 1908 statue.

Helen Keller's public profile helped destigmatize blindness and deafness. Actually disabilities encouraged her to develop wisdom and understanding from beyond the senses and she was seen as a powerful example of someone overcoming difficult circumstances of life. According to her, "The most beautiful things in the world cannot be seen or even touched; they must be felt with the heart".

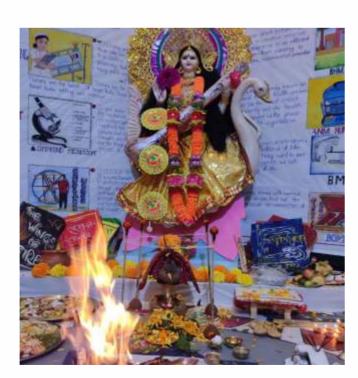

and seminars conducted in this book fair. TIPS students, faculty and staff members attended the inaugural program of the 38thAgartala Book fair.



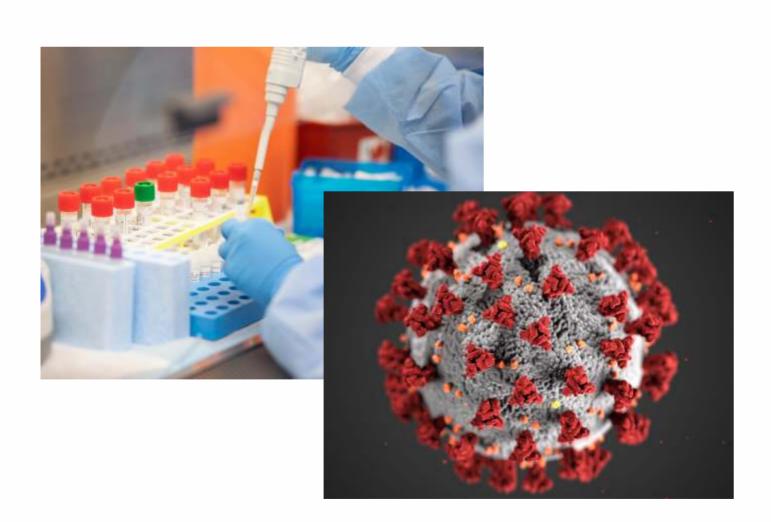


Seminar on COVID19:
